Kitten season is upon us. It refers to the time of year when many litters of kittens are born. Each year, shelters throughout the country are flooded with momma's, babies and strays during the months of April-October.

So what causes kitten season?

Did you know that a female cat can become pregnant at 5 months and can have several litters in one year. With each litter averaging 4 to 6 kittens per litter, that amounts to 12 to 18 kittens. That's a lot of babies in one year! Unfortunately, all of this breeding is one of the main factors contributing to the overpopulation problem.

What can you do to help?

The best way to help with kitten season is to ensure that your cats are spayed or neutered. This is true even for indoor-only cats. As we all know, cats can be sneaky. The door only has to be open for a moment for your cat to escape and come back pregnant.

You can help us at the Wyoming County SPCA navigate this time of year in several ways! We could always use more hands on deck with volunteers.



FIV cats are Pawsitively Adoptable!



FIV stands for feline immunodeficiency virus. FIV typically weakens the cat's immune system. It can be shared between an FIV+ nursing mother and her kittens but more typically is it caused by deep bite wounds from an FIV+ cat biting another cat; the kind of bite wound that occurs in fights between two un-neutered male cats fighting over an unspayed female.

FIV+ is diagnosed through a blood test that is done at your veterinarian's office and you will have the results in 10 minutes. A cat can test positive as early as two to four weeks after exposure, but in some cases, it can take up to eight weeks.

*Kittens under six months of age may test falsely positive after having received antibodies from their mothers, either in utero or via milk. (Discuss with your veterinarian.)

FIV+ cannot be treated but, it can be handled by treating any secondary illnesses. There is a vaccine available for FIV. Discussion with your veterinarian will help you decide if this is the right choice for your cat.

Can FIV- and FIV+ cats live together?

This should be a discussion between you and your veterinarian

Can FIV+ cats have a good and long life?

Yes, FIV+ cats can live normal lives, both in quality and duration. They just need to be monitored for infections and dental issues. If FIV+ cats are well cared for, they can be healthy, happy, wonderful pets.



Red Rover Program in the Schools



I have officially started the Red Rover visits to two of the Warsaw YMCA's SACC (School Age Child Care) programs, Pioneer Central School, Attica Central School and my own preschool class. We read the book Max Talks to Me

by Claire Buchwald and Karen Ritz. The second book was The Forgotten Rabbit by Nancy Furstinger.

Max Talks to Me introduced the children to listening with all of your senses, being alert and knowing your pets' needs so you recognize them as did Max's owner. The boy knew when Max was hungry, wanted to go out, when he needed his water bowl refilled, etc. The boy also learned to know how Max showed the boy that he loved him. At the completion of our session, I sent home a page with the children that showed a happy dog, fearful dog, and angry dog so they could learn how to know the signs of when a dog is approachable. The story also reinforced that one never approaches a dog without permission from the dog's owner.

The Forgotten Rabbit is about a rabbit born on a farm, taken to a pet store, and sold to a family at Easter Time. The kids in the story thought Bunny was real cute and fun for a while. But by wintertime Bunny was living in a hutch with a frozen water bottle, no food, and no shelter in her hutch to keep the weather out. One cold night, Bunny was rescued by a little girl named Roselita who had permission from Bunny's owners to take her and adopt her. Roselita fixed up a new house so Bunny no longer had to live in a cage. She lived inside with the family and ate healthy food. Roselita gave Bunny a new name, Belle which means "beautiful". Roselita trained Belle in an obstacle course and had her compete with other rabbits where she won a prize. Roselita told Belle that she was an unforgettable rabbit and she would never be forgotten again.

During the reading of the book, we imagined with how we thought Bunny was feeling when the kids were paying attention to her and when they had forgotten to play with her. We talked about how Roselita asked the family if she could have Bunny and didn't just take her. We looked at the differences between Bunny's care from the first family and Roselita. One of the children in the group asked, "If the kids were not going to play with the bunny and love her, why did they even bother to adopt her in the first place!"

Each teaching site will have three more visits with a book discussion and a craft/activity. ~Pam D.

Homemade dog biscuits:

INGREDIENTS:

- ☐ 1 cup pumpkin
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- ☐ 2 eggs
- □ 1/4 cup oil*
- 2 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
- □ 1 teaspoon baking soda

GLAZE:

- 2 tablespoons bacon grease, coconut oil, chicken fat, or any other fat that will solidify at room temperature, melted
- ☐ 1/4 cup smooth peanut butter

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- Combine pumpkin, peanut butter, eggs, and oil in a bowl.
 Add in baking soda and whole wheat flour. Stir until a stiff dough forms. Knead dough or mix just until flour is incorporated.
- Roll out dough with a rolling pin and use a cookie cutter to cut out dog bone shapes, or just bake into little circles like cookies.
 Bake for 15 minutes.
- Whisk the bacon grease and peanut butter until very smooth.
 Drizzle over the treats and cool till glaze hardens (it does best in the fridge or freezer).



Starring Sassy

When I inquired about a cat for our little barn, I was told about Sassy. Sassy was a 13 year old cat that had been at the Wyoming County SPCA for 11 months. He had been an indoor/outdoor cat for his previous owner. I was told he had liked going hunting and he really missed his freedom of coming and going. In the evening it is usually my husband who gives Sassy his moist cat food, some treats and again some brushing and petting. We do this so when he has total freedom, he will come back home for his dinner and to have the barn door closed for his safe keeping.

We turn a heater on in the barn during extremely cold days and Sassy has a heated water bowl which enjoys very much.

We do have some pet chickens and Sassy prefers the chickens not to enter 'his barn' and he will chase after them if they should walk in. When Sassy goes outside and the chickens are out as well, they all just mind their own business and leave each other alone.

It is like Sassy has lived here his whole life. More people should take a chance on an older cat, as Sassy has brought us so much happiness! He is such is such a cool cat! Spay Neuter Assistance Program

Wyoming County SPCA's goal is to help reduce the number of dog and cat births through a proactive Spay Neuter Incentive Program (SNIP). Our SNIP is a voucher-based program, which provides low-cost sterilization services for OWNED dogs and cats. Currently the program is funded with an ASPCA grant money from the NYS Animal Population Control Program.

To be eligible for a voucher under the current WCSPCA SNIP funding you must meet the following NYS APCP criteria:

- The animal must be a cat, kitten, dog or puppy
- The animal must NOT have been imported from outside the state
- The person presenting the animal for sterilization must provide proof of residence in NYS
- The person presenting the animal for sterilization must provide proof of ONE of the following forms of eligibility:


Participation in one of the following programs:

food stamps, supplemental security income for the aged, blind and disabled, low-income housing assistance, Family Assistance, Safety Net Assistance, Medical Assistance or other similar programs suggested by applicants or the ASPCA and approved by the Agriculture and Markets Commissioner OR Adoption from a government shelter or nonprofit animal welfare organization in New York State. (No proof of ownership shall be required given the difficulty in identifying a consistent or decisive form of proof, especially with respect to cats (e.g., barn cats); therefore, only proof of low-income assistance or adoption from an eligible shelter shall be required.

Current SNIP vouchers include spay/neuter surgery; a rabies vaccination, and distemper vaccination and flea treatment if indicated

SNIP Program Details

- Vouchers are issued for use at Perry Veterinarian Clinic locations
- \$20 Cash co-payment per animal must be paid to the Wyoming County SPCA.
- The voucher must be used within 60 days from the date of issue.
